Montauk Airport

Flies Low with a High Profile

A summer primer on KMTP

he Montauk Airport, known as KMTP or MTP in aviation parlance, was constructed in 1957 to improve access to the hamlet by Perry Duryea Jr, who often piloted his own plane between Montauk and Albany while serving as a member of the New York State Assembly.

Today, the airport, which is out near the end of East Lake Drive, is used by recreational pilots, weekenders, beach day trippers, sport fishermen, golfers... AND yes, a celebrity or two, who fly in to enjoy our beautiful hamlet in season. KMTP mainly serves the local community and its seasonal visitors, much like the small airports of Block Island, Martha's Vineyard, Nantucket and Cape Cod.

Surrounded by more than 1,000 acres of county parkland with shrubbery, wetlands and dune is a 3,200-foot runway, a taxiway, six hangars, and a small terminal with two restrooms and two showers. The raw beauty there is stunning. Beach plums, blueberry bushes and cattails line the runway. Wildlife is abundant with deer, fox, and wild turkeys frequently seen meandering. Seagulls, too, often use the tarmac to open their meals.





Gin Beach on Block Island Sound is at the northeast end of the runway. If you walk or drive out towards Shagwong Point along the beach (park at Gin Beach at the end of East Lake Drive, permit required) you may catch a closeup of a plane right overhead on approach to the airport. At the other side, along East Lake Drive, are a few excellent restaurants like Rick's Crabby Cowboy Cafe, Dave's Grill, and Inlet Seafood, plus several marinas on Lake Montauk. Helen Gil, the Airport Manager, says that Pilots from neighboring coastal communities often fly in for the day just to relax at Gin Beach with picnic lunches or hit the restaurants on East Lake Drive, and never make it into town.

Gil says that annually about 5,000 aircraft, mostly single- and twin-engine, take off and land at KMTP, which is the island's easternmost airport. Fifteen planes are based at the facility, or tie down for the summer there. Most flights involve locally based aircraft with a mix of helicopters and twin-engine planes and seaplanes doing drop-ins for the summer season. Noise abatement procedures are strictly enforced, Gil says, adding that helicopter and other commercial flights are very cooperative with these rules.

Gil notes that the airport is a crucial resource for the community. Should Montauk Highway ever flood along the Napeague stretch and isolate Montauk, for instance,





KMTP could be used to bring in relief supplies and emergency personnel. Moreover, KMTP currently serves as a "reliever airport" for other smaller airports in case of emergencies.

"Things are fine just the way they are and no expansion is planned," Gil says when asked about the airport's future. "Our management is happy to keep it small, and keep it real." (A)







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respectable selection of a rather niche product is incongruously displayed behind the counter in Jimmy Martell's quaint, nostalgic store on Main Street, which for decades has supplied Montauk with a broad range of traditional staples such as stationary, gifts, greeting cards, newspapers, beach chairs, umbrellas, maps, hiking books, candy, toys, games and nautical gifts. Enter cigars, and Cuban ones at that.

Outwardly a hodgepodge of necessities for tourists and locals alike, Martell's Stationary and Gifts has been around for decades and remains a Montauk institution that is overlooked by many but deserves a visit from all. You're likely to be underwhelmed walking in but will probably exit with a purchase. It's a curiously compelling place in a quaint, almost surreal, way, and living Montauk history.

Owner Jim Martell, whose family started the first Martell's out by the Montauk Lighthouse in 1929, said that back then, they carried only a few machine-made cigars to go with the victuals appropriate for the day.

"At this tiny convenience stand next to the former Wyandanee Inn my parents had a small selection of cigars along with all the souvenir and tourist items. But it grew

over the years and we relocated our store a few times." Jim chuckled. The old Wyandanee Inn was constructed in 1928. After the military pulled out of Camp Hero in the late 1960's, the buildings were so dilapidated that the fire department burned them down, including the inn.

In 1946, Jim's parents, Jenny and





Jim Martell, Sr., moved their store to the first floor of the family's aas station, which is adjacent to their current location at 809 Main Street, at the corner of Essex Street. For many years they lived over the gas station, near their store. An avid fisherman, Jim Sr. added lots of fishing equipment, including lures and plugs, to the store, which continued selling numerous Montauk souvenirs, gifts,



papers, ice cream, candy and beach items.

In 1956, Martell's moved to its current location and eventually doubled in size as business grew. Jim Jr. took the reins in 1976 after his father's death and after years of expanding the store, decided in the 2000s to increase the size of the cigar selection and added, for good measure, his personal coin and rock collections... the latter gathered from hiking around Montauk. Many of Jim's cigar selections are handmade, stacked on shelves, and climate controlled for temperature and humidity.

Boosting the cigar portfolio satisfies Jim's own love of a good cigar now and then but also responds to a growth in popularity. "People have asked for them," he said, walking over to the humidor behind his front counter. "The whole cigarette market is shrinking due to health concerns, but if people puff on a cigar now and then it seems to satisfy them with less guilt, and it's also more relaxing."

Jim says that to fully appreciate a cigar, it must be kept at a certain level of

humidity to prevent the tobacco from drying out and the specimen from becoming brittle. He notes the importance of sealing the cigar in an air-tight bag if it is to be smoked later.

The ciaar "department" at Martell's offers a

full selection of choices, from basic handmade cigars up to special aficionado specimens...and most recently, the Cubans.

"About six months ago I started working on getting Cuban cigars, and I'm still in the process," he says. "The Cuban cigar market is growing and hopefully will expand further."

When asked about the price range, Jim explains that house brand cigars, made in Nicaragua, range from \$3.95 to \$4.29. "But once you get into name brand cigars, there are all different prices ranges, from Cuban Round at \$5.95 to Oliva Serie G (aged Cameroon from Nicaragua) at \$11.49. Some of the top end cigars are Padron, at \$16.50 up to the \$20 range. Then there are specialty cigars that are high priced and suited to unique customers. "For example, a 'God of Fire' cigar, by Carlito, sells for \$49.95," he said.

Martell's also sells "cigar box empties," or empty cigar boxes, which are often

decorative and used to store personal items, for \$2.50 each. He even has cigar casks made into banks, where people can keep their change.

Jim says that most of his customers settle on a particular cigar once they hit upon one that really appeals. He said some customers prefer darker versus lighter tobacco, which has a bearing on the taste of the cigar. He said tobacconists usually have selections that comprise both darker or lighter tobacco in the same cigar configurations that customers have come to enjoy.

"People enjoy cigars for many of the same reasons that they enjoy wine," said Jim. "The draw and taste of a cigar has a lot to do with regional soil conditions and weather, along with the different types of tobacco seeds used in the growing area. Also, the mix of tobacco leaves in the make-up of the cigar, along with how it is rolled and wrapped, makes for an always revealing experience."

So next time you're craving a cigar in Montauk (yes, we understand that is probably not why you are here), stop by Martell's Stationary and Gift Store on Main Street, near their gas station, for a fix and a bit of Montauk nostalgia.

Jim notes: "The times may have changed but our name is still the same. We've been in business for many years and are one of the few places left where the person behind the counter shares a name with the store sign."



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

We could tell this large yet warm restaurant in Montauk was popular as even mid-week there was about an hour wait. My dining partner and I cruised through a cozy cocktail area outside the main bar where people sat on high tables eating, or drinking. The bar had a lively crowd in this sophisticated dining spot. The manager, Brienne, seated us at a table for two in the back facing the amazing Fort Pond landscape. Part of the beauty of Montauk is its magical lighting. We watched the last rays of sun slip behind the watery horizon, leaving only streaks of lavender and pink. So far so good. ONMONTAUK.COM 43

Harvest is one of four restaurants owned by Fort Pond Bay Company, which creates waterfront restaurants and inns. They also own East by Northeast Restaurant in Montauk. which is also on Fort Pond, and the adjacent, newly renovated Stone Lion Inn. They also own two upstate restaurants—Harvest on Hudson and Half Moon Restaurant, in Westchester

Our waitress Jean came right over to take our drink order. Chardonnay and a Dewar's on the rocks. All around us, couples, families and large groups looked happy and relaxed in this pleasant atmosphere. I had been told by friends to try the Calamari Salad, an easy decision, and since my dining partner loves shellfish we also ordered the PEI Mussels (for Prince Edward Island). They came in a tasty juice with wine, garlic, tomatoes, onions and shallots, which was perfect for dipping the crusty bread which came with our meal. The large Calamari Salad was indeed

It consisted of a very healthy portion of delicate, lightly fried calamari mingled with light, fresh Frisee lettuce, all tossed with a zesty miso vinaigrette. If you like Calamari, this salad is a no brainer.

Harvest is known for its generous servings but you can choose from either half or whole portions in the off-season. Either way you will not go home hungry. We chose half-portions all around and still took some food home

It was a hard choice for the entrees My friend was stuck between the Pork Tenderloin and the Skirt Steak while I pondered the Seafood Bruschetta. one of their most popular dishes with assorted seafood, and the Montauk Fluke. Since I'm a fisherman's daughter I can never resist good old-fashioned fresh fish off the dock and I know you can't go wrong with fluke or flounder in the fishing capital of Montauk. I was pleased with my choice as the

two large pieces of fluke were pan-seared to perfection atop

choice.

some lovely Risotto, with gardenfresh carrots and peas. My friend enjoyed the huge portion of Skirt Steak, medium rare. It was super tender and served with a large helping of tasty arugula salad.

Executive Chef Jake Williams specializes in Italian and seafood fare, and much of it is served family-style. Other entrees include Swordfish Picata and Salmon.

There are also Grilled Pizzas and Pasta dishes. The wait staff is plentiful



and the service is excellent...we had two waitresses tending to us, Jean and Lauren, with strong, young Justin running all the food out from the kitchen.

The desserts at Harvest are, consistently, enormous. When I saw my Flourless Chocolate Torte with Coffee Gelato. Hazelnuts and Whipped Cream, I knew I was taking some home. It

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was sinful and delicious...moist, dark

chocolate cake with a rich chocolate icing. My friend enjoyed her Tiramisu, which was a large saugre of chocolate-cheese-filled loveliness. She noted that it was super tasty and "light as air."

Other amazing desserts on the menu include Cinnamon Dusted Cronut (a combination of croissant and donut). Frozen Key Lime Pie. and Crème Puffs. Since we were more than full, on the way out we decided to stroll around the garden patio that contains outside seating in summer. This is a lovely place to sit, with great views of the pond.

Harvest is open year-round, seven days during the season from 5 p.m. to 10 p.m. Sunday through Thursday, and 5 p.m. to 11 p.m.

Uihlein'sMarina Turns

Henry Uihlein (pronounced "You Line") sat behind his desk at Uihlein's Marina, taking one phone call after another. "Yes, the fishing's good, we can rent you a boat. If you have experience and the weather's good you can go to the lighthouse," he said. "Yes, we have bait." Another phone call. "We have jet skis, water skis, wake boarding...."

Another phone call. "Oh no! I forgot my doctor's appointment!" I'll be there in a half-hour." Someone knocks on the office door. "Henry, can you help these people at the counter? They are looking for maps to show them where to fish."


Henry is now behind the front counter as a young couple asks him for buckets to hold fish. He is helping them decide where to take the boat today, and he calls his friend, Captain Jay. "Where did you and Phil get all the fish the other day?" he asks. Jay tells him to try Cherry Harbor, and he tells the couple. Just then, someone comes in to ask about boat storage at Uihlein's high and dry storage facility across the street. Next a few old friends stop by to say hello. Then the fire inspector drops

in to do an annual inspection.

Henry is on the phone again...and then he gets a call about room rentals at his motel across the street. Then he gets another call from his retail guy who wants to know if he has enough bait, clams and squid. "I never stop!" yelled Henry. "My cell phone goes off 100 times a day." And so it goes at Uihlein's Marina and Motel out at the dock area on West Lake Drive...if you can get 5 minutes of Henry's time, you're a lucky person. Henry is a hard worker like his








parents, who started Uihlein's Marina in 1957 and Uihlein's Motel in the early 1950's.

"This year, we're celebrating our 60th Anniversary of the marina and our 65th year at the motel," said Henry proudly. "My Mom and Dad would be happy."

His father, Henry Uihlein, Sr., a mechanic, started the marina and added Gulf Gas in 1957. He fixed cars and boats, and eventually had a fleet

of 24, 16-foot rental skiffs. He and his wife, Charlotte, lived in Howard Beach, Queens, where Henry, Sr. was born and raised, until the family moved into their Montauk motel in the early 1950's when Henry, Jr. was three. "My Mom and Dad first came to Montauk on a motorcycle in 1928, just for the day," Henry, Jr. recalled. "They liked it so much, they just kept coming out to visit."





York started their condemnation process around Howard Beach, where his father had a junk vard, because they were expanding the former Idlewild Airport (now JFK). When they finally condemned his business property in the early 1950's, Henry and Charlotte decided to buy property and move to Montauk. They built their motel (formerly called the West Lake Drive Motel), where they also lived: it was, and is, right across the street from the marina.

Henry Uihlein, Sr. did car and boat repairs and welded anchors for many well-known Montauk fishermen like Capt. Frank Mundus, Capt. Dusty Doerzbacher, and Capt. Bob Tuma. "My Dad was a jack of all trades," said Henry, Jr. "He built the shark cage for Capt. Frank Mundus, who caught the famous 4,500-pound great white shark." His father also created and built a "boom truck" so he could drag whales and sharks onto the beach by Gosman's Restaurant. It was a sort of dump

> truck, rigged up with pipes and a cable. His father also built a railway system into the water to enable him to pull boats out on the tracks.

Henry, Sr. loved being a mechanic and he used his skills to help people. "When people got stuck at the docks on a Saturday or Sunday night after fishing all day, when no auto parts stores were open and their cars wouldn't start. my Dad would solve the problem," said Henry. Jr. "He would fix the parts instead of making them get new ones, and





somehow he would always get them home "

He said local dock characters with names like "Bernie the Brute." "Beer Belly Chet," and "Pete the Tramp," would come to his father asking for favors, wanting to use his Dad's oil pit for their cars and offering to pay him

came to Montauk, they already had four older daughters - Mary Westuba, Charlotte Granau, Jean Ehm, and Carol Maher - who were married with kids. Their fifth child, Henry, Jr., was just three when he moved to Montauk with his parents.

later, or with a six-pack. As an example of how much hard work his parents put into the marina and motel, Henry Jr. said, "They changed their lives to come to Montauk. My Dad loved fishing, and he had a boat in Howard Beach, but once they came here, he worked long

hours every day and he never fished."

His mother, Charlotte, ran the former West Lake Drive Motel. which was later changed to Uihlein's Motel. in the heart of the fishing docks. By the time she and her husband

me," Henry, Jr. laughed. "She took me to every ball game, she ran up the island to get parts for my Dad, and gave him three square meals a day. She was a great mother and wife, and she never stopped talking." Henry Jr. said his parents came to Montauk to





be a part of the local community. "They came out to Montauk to make it their home, not just to invest, make money, and flip it," he said. "They contributed greatly to the community, and my Mom became active in the Montauk Community Church."

Throughout high school, Henry, Jr. also worked at the marina, washing boats, and doing errands. During his college summers, he learned to paint and rent boats, repair engines, and wait on customers. His parents never forced him into the business and he went his own way to become a physical

education teacher, working in the Shelter Island School. But in 1977 his father died. Henry kept teaching for five years afterwards while running the marina. In 1982 he transitioned full time to the family business.

"This is my 40th year alone here," said Henry, Jr. "Over the years I expanded the marina, building a 6,000 square-foot boat storage facility across the street. My Dad stored about 35 boats for the winter and I now have 216." His boat storage is now open year-round and although it wasn't easy replacing his Dad's skills, Henry found Jeremy




Somero, his now long-time mechanic, who he credits with the success of his business. "He has skill, sincerity, honesty, personality and ethics, just like my Dad," said Henry, Jr. "He's a problem-solver...he made the business what it is today."

Henry, Jr. is proud to have his son (yes, named Henry) working at the Marina over the busy summer months when he's on college break. He's not forcing him into the business, as he himself wasn't, but is happy to have him staying involved with the marina.

Henry, Jr. eventually bought two forklifts and the property next to him, including Sammy's Restaurant, expanded the waterfront by 200 feet, and remodeled the motel, with seven efficiency rooms. While his father had 24 16-foot wooden skiffs for rent, today Henry, Jr. rents 18 fiberglass boats, up to 32 feet, as well as jet skis, water skis, wake boards, and tubes.

This summer, Henry, Jr. is getting ready for the annual Montauk Mercury Grand Slam Fishing Tournament, held at Uihlein's Marina on July 15 and 16. It benefits the Montauk Friends of Erin and the East Hampton Kiwanis Club,



of which he is a member and past president. This big tournament is open to all adults, kids and families and this year will be honoring Capt. Frank Tuma, Sr., owner of the former "Tuma's Dock" and charter service, as "Fishing Legend of the Year." To register, call Uihlein's Marina at 631-668-3799 or visit www.uihleinsmarina.com.

How does Henry, Jr. feel about his business success? "I grew up a dock kid, along with the Kenny, Sweeney and Nicoletti families, and I'm proud to still be in this wonderful harbor of Montauk," he said.

Beaches



DOGS are not allowed on the beaches 10am - 6pm from May 15 through September 15. No restrictions apply for the remainder of the year.

BEACH FIRES are allowed on main town beaches from 5pm - 12am but must be fully contained in a metal container. Other regulations apply. Go to onmontauk. com/beach-fire-regulations for a complete list of all requirements.

FOUR WHEEL DRIVE

permits for the main town beaches can be purchased at the Town Hall Annex in the Montauk Playhouse. Free to town residents. they cost \$275 per year for non-residents. No vehicles allowed on the beaches 10am - 6pm, May 21- September 15, Other beaches around Montauk require various state or county driving permits. Read posted signs.

PUBLIC PARKING is free at the Kirk Park Beach. across from 7-11 and IGA Supermarket, and \$10 at Hither Hills State Park. Many hotels and motels provide temporary permits for their quests. Other beaches require a permit, free for residents, but \$375 per vear for non-residents. for sale at the Town Hall Annex. The Hither Hills Neighborhood beach along Old Montauk Highway has four private parking areas for neighborhood residents only.

CEAN SWIMMING CAN BE FUN, BUT THE POWER OF THE water can overwhelm even experienced swimmers caught in a strong current, or rip. To be safe, always swim at a beach with a lifequard and never swim alone. Lifequards are generally on duty at all public beaches from 10am-5pm through Labor Day.

AMSTERDAM BEACH

(remote, unspoiled, quiet, hike to access, no facilities, doas OK)

Walk the trail at Amsterdam Beach State Park and be rewarded by one of the most breathtaking vistas of unspoiled shoreline on the east coast. Meander along the intermittently sandy and rocky shoreline eastward or westward and be humbled. The 50-minute round-trip wooded hike includes a tunnel of American Holly and several exotic large oaks. Bring insect repellant and water as the beach has no facilities, no lifequards...and probably no other people. Park (free) on the south side of Rt. 27 across from Deep Hollow Ranch en route to Montauk Point. ehtps.org/ amsterdam-beach-preserve/

DITCH PLAINS BEACH

(surfer spot, families, can get crowded,

permit parking)

Popular with surfers, this beach is two miles east of the village on the ocean with parking by permit only at two parking areas. The super long break makes surfing ideal for newbies or veteran lonaboarders. This iconic beach has beautiful cliffs rising at its western end at Shadmoor Park, restrooms, outdoor showers, lifequards during the summer season, and concession trailers that serve more than iust snacks.

EDISON BEACH

(sandy, walkable from village hotels, close to everything, limited parking)

At the heart of the Village at the end of South Edison Street, this popular beach has a lifeguard on duty during the summer months, restaurants, restrooms, and stores nearby. Limited public parking. Be mindful of the dunes, which were recently stabilized.

GIN BEACH

(sound side, calm, families, boat watching, walk to Shagwong point, permit parkina)

At the end of Fast Lake Drive on Block Island Sound: and named for the cattle gins, or pens, that resided here for hundreds of years, Gin Beach is areat for

families with children, with gentle water and sandy beaches. You can watch the boats come in and out of Montauk Harbor. or take a walk on the jetty. Parking by permit only. Restrooms, outdoor showers. a concession trailer, lifequards during the summer season, and a nearby restaurant provide all the family needs for a day at the beach

HITHER HILLS STATE PARK

(public parking, many facilities, sandy, families)

Four miles west of town on Old Montauk Highway. Lifequards daily from mid June-Labor Day. Non-campers pay a \$10 parking fee. Nice playground, picnic tables, outdoor showers, restrooms, a changing area, and a general store.

KIRK PARK BEACH

(main town beach with free parking area; wide, sandy, open, families) West of the Village by the IGA supermarket, this sandy beach stretches over 500 feet. Park for free at Kirk Park parking lot. Public restrooms located next to the parking lot. Lifequards, restaurants and stores are within walking distance, along with a park and picnic area across the street. The dunes were recently stabilized and stairways were put in place.

NAVY ROAD BEACH

(sound side, calm, pebbly, kayak launch, families, no facilities, permit parking) On beautiful Fort Pond Bay at the end of 2nd House Rd. Great for launching kayaks. paddleboards, and small boats. A favorite spot for locals and families. The beach is pebbly, so take swim shoes. Parking by permit only. Dine waterside at Navy Beach, just down the beach. Boats and small yachts frequently moor in the Bay.

THE OTHER BEACHES

(walkable even if not parkable)

Montauk, surrounded by water on three sides, has many more beaches, but most of them are not protected by lifequards and parking is not straightforward. For those who enjoy walking the beach, there are many options, as all beaches are public up to the high tide mark. A popular walk is from the village to Ditch Plains beach, where you see the cliffs of Shadmoor on the way. At high tide parts of the beach may be impassable.

The H.M.S. Culloden, a popular dive spot, is about a mile west of the Montauk jetties at Culloden Point. The English frigate "Culloden" sank in 1871 just 150 feet offshore and rests in about 20 feet of water



SURFING

Montauk is one of the East Coast's top surfing towns. The culture is magnified by surfer-themed restaurants and shops. Ditch Plains is the heart and soul of the surfer community. If you surf Ditch and you are a newbie, remember Ditch etiquettethe surfing areas are 250 feet in either direction to the east and west of the bathing beach. Surfers looking for bigger waves head to Camp Hero, a rock-studded patch of right breakers beneath the cliffs, and Turtle Cove, the farthest east and perhaps best Montauk break, just below the Montauk Lighthouse.

En route detour to Camp Hero State Park where roads curve through secluded wooded areas near the ocean. Take a three-mile detour to Montauk Harbor on West Lake Drive, a flat route with wide shoulders.

Mountain bikers can enjoy scenic rides over thousands of acres of parkland for the best mountain biking on Long Island. Bike trails in Hither Woods such as Talkhouse Trail and Serpent's Back offer several levels of difficulty.



Hither Hills campground. The top seasons for surfcasting are spring and fall, when stripers linger off Montauk before migrating, but our big blues can be found from July through October. Permits to park after hours at Camp Hero and the Montauk Point Lighthouse Parking Lot or on the beach by the Lighthouse are sold at Montauk Downs, 631-668-5000. Purchase Gin Beach driving permits at the park office at the end of East Lake Drive. Note: A license (it's free) is required to fish beaches in NY State. Acquire your Marine Fishing License at **dec.ny.gov**.

FRESHWATER FISHING

Bass, sunfish, perch, and walleyes inhabit Montauk's ponds and lakes. Fort Pond is the largest, but others are deep in the woods, like Oyster Pond in Montauk Point State Park or Fresh Pond in Hither Hills State Park. Fresh water fishing requires a license—ask at the NY State Park office at Montauk Downs. Fishing at Big Reed Pond in Theodore Roosevelt County Park requires a "Green Key" card, available at Montauk Downs.

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


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ONTAUK IS SURROUNDED BY WATER, AND TRAILS...THAT MEANDER THROUGH ACRES OF UNSPOILED PARKS THAT EXIST FOR US AND OUR wildlife. White-tailed deer, foxes, raccoons, woodchucks, squirrels, opossums, and chipmunks abound. Watch for deer while driving! Rare and majestic birds also frequent the End. You may spot an osprey, red-tailed hawk, piping plover, or even a bald eagle. Sizable concentrations of migrating birds rest in the waters off Montauk Point while seals inhabit our rocky shores during the winter months. Gannets torpedo into the ocean in fall seeking bait fish. You get the picture... you're in a natural paradise. Trail Maps are available at the Montauk Bike Shop and the Town Hall Annex in the Montauk Playhouse.

AMSTERDAM BEACH PRESERVE (Great hike to the beach)

A 200-acre passive use park stretching from Ranch Road at Indian Field on the east to the Montauk Association houses (seven cottages designed by the firm of McKim, Mead and White in the 1880's) to the west. It is bordered on the north by Montauk Highway and extends southward to the Atlantic Ocean and the ocean beach. The natural topography, called "Montauk Moorlands," has tidal and freshwater wetlands interspersed throughout maritime shrub lands. This main trail head on Montauk Highway begins a one-mile hike to the ocean bluffs taking you through a holly arbor and across streams. The hilly trail affords peeks of ocean through the brambles and ends at the ocean beach and bluffs. This easy-tonavigate trail offers a unique reward of unspoiled coastal beauty.

CAMP HERO STATE PARK

This 415-acre State Park is a decommissioned military installation converted to a state park in 2002 and a National Historic Site (also the home of conspiracy theories linked to the Philadelphia project). Several buildings, bunkers, batteries, and an old radar building remain, although they are off limits to the public. Roads cross the park, along with an extensive system of trails for hiking, bicycling, horseback riding, a beach used by surfers and surfcasters, a picnic area with grills and an old maritime forest. Park at Camp Hero Park (just west of the lighthouse) for trails and roads through Camp Hero. Parking fee is \$8 in

season. Open daily year-round from sunrise to sunset. You can also park your car on Camp Hero Road (a right turn four miles east of the village, not to be confused with the entrance to Camp Hero Park) to hike Point Woods Trail, one of Montauk's most beautiful trails, taking you south of the Montauk Highway all the way to the bluffs. Attractions: views of pristine beaches, cliffs, the lighthouse, military buildings, and an old maritime forest.

CULLODEN

This park is named after the HMS Culloden, a British 74-gun warship sailing with the Channel Fleet during the American Revolutionary War. The natural wooded area leading up to the shoreline of Culloden is also public. The trailhead is on the left side of Flamingo Road next to a small plaque commemorating the shipwreck. The marked trail from the parking area to Culloden Point is less than a mile. The natural wooded area and shoreline has seen little change from the days when the Montauketts lived here in a world of hidden ponds,

specimen trees, wetlands, and a beautiful shoreline. Attractions: Views of the bluffs at Culloden Point.

EDDIE ECKER COUNTY PARK

(Great dog spot)

Located at the end of Navy Road near Rocky Point, the park has a parking lot, a dock suitable for fishing, and a rocky beach. Offers easy access to trails in Hither Woods Preserve. Good place for launching kayaks and canoes. Take your dogs to play. Open year round.

FORT POND HOUSE AT CAROL MORRISON PARK

The Fort Pond House and Carol Morrison Park are located on a four-acre site in the Shepherd's Neck area of Montauk overlooking Fort Pond. Carol Morrison was a well-loved conservationist and it is appropriate that this park, which narrowly escaped being sold to private developers in 2010, should be named after her. The park is open from dawn to dusk and the house is available for meetings and other events by appointment through the East Hampton Town Recreation Department.

HIKING TIPS

- Buy a trail map. Although major trails are marked, many divergent ones are not.
 At times during the year, leaf cover can mask main trails, making it easy to get lost on side trails or even deer paths.
- After heavy rains some trails are completely or partially underwater. The Montauk Bike Shop in the village will answer any questions and sells trail maps.
- 3. AVOID TICKS: With a few simple precautions, hikers and walkers can enjoy walks through our beautiful woodlands and avoid the menace of ticks. Experts recommend that you stay on the trails, wear light colors, make sure you are well covered, and use an insect repellent. Ticks tend to congregate on tall grasses, so avoid walking through these areas. After you walk or bike, check the family for ticks, particularly tiny deer ticks, which may carry Lyme disease.

HITHER HILLS STATE PARK

Located four miles west of the village of Montauk on Old Montauk Highway, with a two-and-a-half-mile beach along the Atlantic Ocean and 1,755 acres of parkland. Hither Hills has 168 campsites which can be reserved through

ReserveAmerica.com, along with hiking and nature trails. Activities include ocean swimming, saltwater fishina, sauare dancina, auided nature hikes, and children's programs. Non-campers are welcome, but must pay a \$10 daily parking fee. Open year round from sunrise to sunset. (631-668-2554). Hither Hills State Park along with Hither Woods Preserve and Lee Koppelman Nature Preserve form adjacent multi-use parks containing 3,000 acres with 18 different trails covering over 40 miles of terrain. Bike or hike to Fresh Pond, or take a beautiful coastal walk at Rocky Point; these loops are suitable for both walking and mountain biking. Here, trails, roads, and places retain their old colorful names. Even though the trails are blazed with color-coded markers, hikers should

take maps. Park at either the overlook at Hither Woods, the recycling center (1.5 miles west of the village on Montauk Highway), or at the Navy Road (Eddie Ecker Park) parking lot. The **Montauk Bike Shop** in the village arranges group and corporate tours, rents mountain bikes, and gives advice. Attractions: Fresh Pond; trails skirting Block Island Sound, Napeague beach, and dunes.

KIRK PARK

This quaint three-acre park, just west of the village, is maintained by the Montauk Village Association. It includes Fort Pond, which is the second largest freshwater lake on Long Island, a picnic area, a pavilion on Fort Pond, and it's next to Second House Museum and Montauk Indian Museum. The park hosts events year-round.

MONTAUK DOWNS STATE PARK

A 160-acre park that has an 18-hole public golf course (see Landsports). It also has a driving range, a putting green, and six Har-True tennis courts. A large outdoor pool and a wading pool for children is open in summer. 631-668-5000.

MONTAUK MOUNTAIN

A six-acre preserve area maintained by the Nature Conservancy. To get there, follow Second House Road north 0.7 miles to an asphalt road on the left. Park at the end of the asphalt road by the Nature Conservancy sign. The preserve is at the end of the road past the last house on the right.

MONTAUK POINT STATE PARK

This 724-acre park at the site of the Montauk Point Lighthouse offers breathtaking views of the sea, Block Island Sound, and Block Island to the northeast, and is great for bird watching year round and seal watching in the winter months. Park your car and set off on foot to explore the area. Ask for a Montauk Point State Park trail map at the toll booth. The park has surfcasting, five miles of marked and unmarked hiking trails, a picnic area with tables, a playground, a restaurant, a gift shop, and restrooms. Daily parking costs \$8. The Montauk Point Lighthouse, a museum run by the Montauk Historical Society, is open to the public daily in season. This park is contiquous with Camp Hero Park and the Sanctuary and there are several hiking trails that cross them. To the north of Montauk Highway, look for signs for Money Pond Trail, Oyster Pond trail and the Seal Haul Out Trail, where seals can be seen on the rocks just offshore from December through April. Attractions:

SHADMOOR STATE PARK

beautiful rugged shorelines, migrating

birds, hidden ponds, seals in the winter.

Located two miles east of the village on Montauk Highway, this 99-acre tract of land has a half mile of ocean frontage where tall clay cliffs plunge down to a pebble strewn beach. If you are coming by car, park in the parking lot at the entrance to the park. About 30 percent of Shadmoor is freshwater wetlands with several small ponds hidden in the thickets. Trails and dirt roads lead to the bluffs from the entrance on Montauk Highway, offering an easy, though sometimes muddy, walk. A passive-use park, Shadmoor was home to two WWII gun emplacement sites trained on offshore waters to deter German submarines. A good family hike. Attractions: dramatic vistas of Montauk shoreline, sea and rolling waves, easy hike.



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Parks & Trails

MONTAUK COUNTY PARK

Two entrances: one at the end of East Lake Drive just north of the airport, where the park office is located, and the other at Third House, three miles east of the village on Montauk Highway. A total of 1,126 acres features three and a half miles of color coded nature trails restricted for hiking (a self-auided nature trail brochure is available), five miles of bridle paths, a picnic area, freshwater fishing and canoeing at Big Reed Pond, surfcasting on the outer beach (Gin Beach and Shagwong Point), and hunting in the winter, in season. Camping is permitted for up to seven days from April through November on the outer beach for four-wheel drive vehicles with permits that are self-contained trailers. Tents are not allowed. You must have a Suffolk County Green Card, suffolkcountyny.gov. The view of Big Reed Pond from the observation deck on the blue trail, will make you understand why Big Reed Pond is a Registered Natural Landmark. Attractions: hiking, views, fishing, camping.

WALKING DUNES

Part of Hither Hills State Park on the east side of Napeague Harbor, the Walking Dunes reach a height of 80 feet as they slowly move southeast. To get to the dunes, head west on Montauk Highway and turn right at Napeague Harbor Road to the end of the paved road. Park your car here and take off on foot following the path to your right. Continue on this path and you will reach the dunes. A self-quided nature trail takes you on a three mile-long loop-trail with great views of Napeague Harbor and winds atop the ridge of the North Dune, which is the most active of the three parabolic, or U-shaped dunes. This area is a natural wonder and deceptively fragile so stay on the trails. Attractions: 80-foot high sand dunes, water birds, views of Napeague Harbor.

GUIDED HIKES

The East Hampton Trails Preservation Society conducts guided hikes year-round of Montauk's trails. Go to their web site: www. ehtps.org, for hike schedules, usually held on Saturdays. The Concerned Citizens of Montauk, 631-238-5720, offer outdoor activities throughout the year. Drop by their office at 6 South Elmwood Avenue in the village for advice or maps; it's your walk-in resource to everything outdoors. ccommontauk.org.

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

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



I lamented that I wasn't taking pictures earlier and I asked Kristin if I could take some shots of her patrons trying things on, but she had a model shoot planned soon and I could use those pics. Perfect.

Something that transitions from surfing or yoga or just a fun day at the beach to an evening out... if they want."

I tell her to get into specifics with me about the pieces now that we have the whole shop to ourselves and she's not distracted by customers. What is the



















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


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
