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TAUK SAFE SURF By BOB MILLER

Ocean Rescuer Bob Miller has spent a life on water; teaching, lifeguarding, coaching...and surfing. With decades of experience under his belt, he's the one guy to take seriously when you and your kids are having fun in paradise. Here in *On Montauk*, he reminds us all to...

THINK BEFORE YOU SINK!



re you thinking: what does that mean? Good, you're thinking and that alone may save your life some day. Imagine that: being able to make a good

choice in what could be a life-threatening situation. Does that have your attention? Okay then...

Can I ask y'all a question? Again great — your brain is working. So, when you are out in the ocean surfing, what are you in the most danger from? Rip currents, rocks, lightening bolts, or the infamous 'man in the grey suit' nope... it's **you**!

With all due respect, it is most likely your own board that will hit you if you're not careful, so...hold onto that thing. Your board is your responsibility. Where it goes and any damage it causes can be quite serious. Anyhow, this is not just about holding onto your board, although y'all ought to, but it's about keeping your cool and remaining calm when challenged by the ocean. So there are some simple things that, for nearly thirty years, I've been sharing with kids as young as six. Things like the saying 'think before you sink.'

Thinking about being safe in the ocean is something that crosses my mind every time I ever go surfing. It's not so much about fear of the ocean but respect for the ocean as an incredibly powerful place. Remember... the real danger is yourself and choices that you yourself make. So let's make good choices while surfing.

There **are** real dangers in the ocean, and things like rip currents have kept the people from some cultures from enjoying what fun surfing can be. Their fear exists and is legitimate, but it's really only there because people didn't have the opportunity to learn to swim or are not exposed to information about these dangerous currents...like the way our town provides rip current signs.



We've all seen this rip current sign, but do any of us know the physics behind the rip? The way the waves reflect... or bounce back off the beach or an object, such as the jetty at Ditch, and look for the easiest path back out to sea? In the impact zone, of the crashing waves, this path is difficult so the water will travel along the shore looking for a hole in the sand bar.



When the energy finds the hole in the sand bar it heads out into deeper water where it spreads out and loses its powerful pull. But why is it so

strong? Because the energy of all the waves up and down the beach is combined together in this narrow river of returning water we call a *rip current*.

This fast-moving current of water with all its energy digs the channel between sand bars deeper, and when unexpected swimmers, or non-swimmers, reach this part of the ocean, they often can no longer touch the bottom...simply because it is deeper, not because of an undertow!

There is actually no such thing as an undertow. There is no magical force pulling anyone under. The water is just deeper here, and the current may be taking you far out to sea, but this is where I'll ask you '*think so you don't sink*' and remember this great article you read in *On Montauk* mag.

I'd like you to think about what I'm about to say. Remember my little voice if you ever get in this situation... and just *chill*. There are some studies that say the natural circular cycle of the water will actually bring you back to the beach if you do nothing but keep calm.

That said, there is also the option of swimming parallel to the shore or on an angle back to the beach, and this will work for most people, but please be aware of which direction you're swimming (again thinking) and don't swim against the long shore current either.

Anyway, we as surfers, on the other hand, absolutely love-love-love rip currents. They are something that should be respected and appreciated but not feared. A rip current is surfing's version of a chair lift and is often the easiest way through the breaking waves.

When I go down to the beach one of the first things I look for are big waves, because they get my heart thumping, but then I look for the rip currents that I'll use to make it easier for me to get outside those breaking waves and I jump right into them, again with respect.

It is this respect that I have for the ocean that I'd ask y'all to share with me. I'd also like to ask that y'all 'think before you sink' and keep safety in your mind whenever you're in the water. And again with all due respect, you are the most dangerous thing out there.

So choose to be safe, please. Hold your board, cover your head, be aware of your surroundings, respect the rip currents, know your limits and know how to get help if you need it—those big **orange** signs at every beach help a 911 operator know where you're @, and say hello to summer! **OM**

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The History & Legend of CAMP HERO

This picture was taken on solid ground in Camp Hero, can you find the spot yourself?

One of Montauk's most historical places is also its most mysterious... and under-appreciated, for both its beauty and recreational opportunities. So, bone up here on the mystery then get out there!

ontauk's Camp Hero is my favorite place on the East End. I go there for the hiking trails and views from the cliffs, but often find myself pondering its history as a secret military base during WW2. It's also hard to resist delving into the site's dark urban legend.

At the eastern-most point of the United States the camp provided wartime defense in the 1940s disguised as a small fishing village, but some say it remained in operation long after that for more sinister purposes. The site is now a State park loaded with hiking trails, beautiful views of the Atlantic, picnic spots, and WW2-era structures. Placards beside huge batteries, which stored military vehicles and held large coastal gun emplacements, explain the camp's wartime history. The batteries were decommissioned in1947, but parts of the camp were still in operation during the Cold War.

The giant radar tower, which still stands high over the ruins like a steel beacon, was to provide early warning for the east coast by transmitting the alert if German U-boats or submarines were detected in the Atlantic. The tower remained active for the US Air Force until 1980. It sits near boarded-up barracks that once housed military personnel, and a small building disguised as a church that was actually a gym. In addition to these relics, there are ominous signs along the hiking trails leading to the beach that warn of landmines that could still be live. On shore lay hollowed-out fortifications that were prepared for use as defense artillery against potential invaders. Salty waves from the raging sea now gush through the eroded concrete walls onto the rocky beach.

The historical record says the base closed following the war, but legend has it that it was re-opened in the early 1980s for topsecret scientific research known as The Montauk Project. Conspiracy theorists say this covert operation drew on the discoveries of Nikola Tesla, whose theories and experimentation were considered unorthodox by conventional science. In some of Tesla's letters, he refers to correspondence with highly advanced beings from outer space.

According to some published accounts, extra-terrestrials assisted the CIA with mind control and inter-dimensional travel that opened portals to other dimensions and let in beings from beyond that still roam the site. It is reported the aliens lived in the camp's underground bunkers. Most disturbing are reports that children were used in the mind control experiments. Youngsters put under spells and commanded to leap from tall buildings were sacrificed in the name of science, according to the legend.



The radar tower is defunct - or is it?

Project to the infamous Philadelphia Experiment. The United States Naval ship, the USS Eldridge, disappeared from a Philadelphia shipyard during radar invisibility testing in 1943 and is said to have appeared off Montauk in 1983, possibly through an inter-dimensional portal. Something went terribly wrong during the invisibility shield experiment and the sailors became physically imbedded in the vessel when their molecules fused with ships'. Many men died during the agonizing ordeal and those who survived were said to have endured a lifetime of psychotherapy due to what they saw that day.

...trails where landmines could still be live?

As the legend goes, Camp Hero was finally closed in the late 1980s and authorities ordered the underground tunnels to be filled with cement and sealed shut. When the site was dedicated as a park in 1992, all the buildings, including the barracks, were boarded up and the site was opened to visitors.

For anyone interested in such tales of monsters, space aliens, and time warps,

ere in Montauk, the ocean attracts countless visitors to its shores each year for a variety of pleasures: world-class fishing, pristine beaches, and an abundance of outdoor activities. Yet for one group of dedicated people involved with A Walk on Water (AWOW), the rolling surf is the ultimate natural resource, possessing transformative, therapeutic properties.

AWOW, based in Southern California and launched in 2012, is again holding a truly inspiring "Surf Therapy" event in Montauk, this year on Friday and Saturday, September 11th & 12th, at Ditch. The primary mission of AWOW, through sponsors, participating local businesses, members, and volunteers, is to offer individuals with special needs or circumstances (along with their families) an amazing day at the beach and in the water.

"Surf Therapy" as described on the organization's website is "The act of guided surf instruction - provided by trained Surf Therapists - in concert with a carefully constructed support structure of volunteers and supporters." Having personally witnessed this unique paradigm in action the last several years, I know that it's clearly something that sets AWOW apart. By encouraging family and friends to participate alongside their Athlete (a term used for each participant, dropping any label of disability), a more "shared" experience is had by all. Additionally, the well-deserved day of respite highlights the best of surf culture by providing healthy meals/snacks alongside numerous family-oriented activities such as yoga, art, and music.

Once an Athlete has been suited-up and is ready to enter the surf, it's up to an exceptional team of watermen to ensure that each is safe while together they

experience the sheer exhilaration of the sport. For the local event, now entering its sixth consecutive year, much of that responsibility falls upon a remarkable group of surfers from CoreysWave, a Montauk-based surf instruction business with family ties that date back to Ditch's fabled surf scene of the 1970's.

During a recent chat, AWOW's Executive Director, Sean Swentek, and founding Board Member/Director of Production, Jason Wolk, heaped tremendous praise

upon those in Montauk who unfailingly come together to make this event such a success, year after year. Montauk local and AWOW's East Coast President, Walt Lindveld, knows firsthand what a supportive community can provide as his son Clash has Down syndrome. Given the incredible reception he gets from countless Athletes and adults, it's not an understatement to say that Clash has reached rock star status!

The profound sense of empowerment participants receive is on display during the daily trophy ceremony at water's edge, where a huge circle of cheering volunteers, supporters, and family members is formed. One by one, AWOW staff call each Athlete by name, inviting them into the center to receive their hand-carved award.

The 2-day event will be capped by a fundraiser and auction on Saturday, September 12th from 6 – 10 pm, hosted by Left Hand Coffee's Co-Founder, Larry Siedlick, at The Montauk Beach House. Food, cocktails, and a guest DJ will keep things rolling at the downtown boutique hotel at 55 South Elmwood Avenue, only a block from the ocean.

AWOW recently announced a team up with the award-winning Media Arts Lab to produce a feature documentary filmed in Cabo San Lucas, Mexico, which highlights the community bonds established through Surf Therapy and the special connection the organization has forged with its surf instructors.

Athletes, family members and those who wish to volunteer are being directed to awalkonwater.org to register. Visitors to the site will find up-to-date information about the documentary, informative bios of the AWOW crew, beautiful photography captured from previous outings, and an opportunity to donate, which goes directly towards hosting future events.





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History to be Laid with a New **LIGHTHOUSE REVENSE**

The Montauk Lighthouse, besieged by the relentlessly encroaching Atlantic, will soon receive a defense for the ages. Fingers crossed!

n over 30 years working as the erosion control expert for the Montauk Lighthouse, Greg Donohue has seen many changes. Over the years there have been numerous people, groups, and organizations involved in shoring up the bluffs and providing stabilizing boulders.

Fighting back the ocean has been a neverending project, from Giorgina Reid's first grass terracing project back in 1970 to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers' current revetment, which contains an exhilarating, if not somewhat treacherous, pedestrian and surfcasters walkway upon the boulders high above the pounding surf. But now, hopefully by the end of 2020, if plans go through as promised, this National Historic Landmark lighthouse will have one final revetment overhaul that will last for generations to come.

A whole new chapter called "The Hurricane and Storm Damage Reduction, Montauk Lighthouse Seawall Stabilization Project" is about to become a reality and will take about two years to complete. It will entail a total restructuring of the current rock revetment, or seawall, which was never engineered from bottom to top and doesn't have a proper long-term foundation. It will also include two unique features -- a new world-class fishing platform for surfcasters and a recreation area for tourists, photographers, bird watchers, and nature lovers.

Donohue said the project went out to bid in late 2019 and is now in the hands of

contracting officers and the lawyers.

"It's out to bid and right now, amid the Coronavirus, everyone is working from home, so it's slowing everything down," he explained. "It's up to the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers to select the contractor and so far, they are looking at two of them."

Donohue said that with good fortune, the project will start in 2020. "The good thing is that the funding is still available, and they are moving forward, but at their pace," he said. "I'm encouraged — the plan is great — but when it starts there will have


to be a lot of concentration and teamwork... and that's what they do."

The Montauk Historical Society, which maintains and oversees the Montauk Lighthouse, started a revetment project in 1991 and spent years petitioning the Federal Government for funding. Over the years they received some funding, but with the many storms and climate changes, more was needed. This new stabilization project will cost \$25 million and be paid for by Federal and State governments, the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers, and the New York State Department of Environmental Conservation, out of funds from Hurricane Sandy relief. The Montauk Historical Society will continue to maintain the lighthouse, which was commissioned by President George Washington in 1792 and built in 1796.

With this new project, the existing seawall will be dismantled and a new one constructed with a different slope angle using the existing gigantic rocks, and many new ones. The new seawall will extend to an elevation of +35 feet above sea level instead of the original +25 feet above sea level, and instead of the 25,000 tons of rock in the existing seawall, the new seawall will include 63,900 tons – greatly increasing its stability.

Donohue said that during the construction, surfcasters will have to stop fishing off the lighthouse for about two years, but at the end of this time, they will have a much safer and sturdier platform. He said that surfers, however, could continue to surf during the construction phase since they are out in the water, adding that they could also move further down the beach.

When told of the revetment overhaul plans, one long-time Montauk Lighthouse surfcaster, Greg Choron, of Montauk and

Greg Donahue gave Montauk the fisherman's gangway under the light. Florida, said that he welcomes the idea. "It's a big increase in safety that's needed," he said. "I've fished off the lighthouse boulders frequently and it's really dangerous, especially on the edges where it becomes more slippery. If I catch a fish, I have to climb down the rocks to land it while enduring the incoming swells, which is really hazardous. This sounds like a much better situation and it's a great fringe benefit to shoring up Montauk's beloved lighthouse." OM

there are books on the subject, incluiding The Montauk Project, Experiments in Time, by Preston Nichols. There have also been movies, YouTube documentaries, and there is currently a television series that draws on the urban legend.

Camp Hero, adjacent to the Lighthouse with ample parking, is formerly known as Fort Hero and is now a registered national historic site. The 400-acre landscape is a perfect setting for people like me who seek solitude, exercise, ocean air, and a little mystery. And you will always find surfers and fishers on the scenic shore because, after all, it's Montauk.

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SECOND HOUSE RESTORATION

Second House is the oldest structure in Montauk, built in 1746. It is historically significant to Montauk's pastoral history when the shepherds and keeper of Second House were housed in the building and were responsible for tending the sheep to the west and the cattle to the east.

WELCOME TO THE SURFCASTING CAPITAL OF THE WORLD!

Right here in Montauk, acre-sized schools of striped bass thrash the surface of the sea to a roiling froth with their tails, often churning their way to within just a few feet of dry sand. At times, fish up to five feet long and weighing 50 pounds or more are feeding within a stone's throw of beach towels.

hether you are visiting Montauk for a weekend away, are a regular summer visitor, or have lived here for decades and just haven't gotten "into" the fishing scene yet, wetting a line from one of Montauk's legendary beaches is a must-do. You ARE in The Surfcasting Capital of the World, after all.

While Montauk might be better known for things other than a surfcasting destination nowadays, that unofficial title was never just some tourism advertiser's Hail Mary to give a once sleepy hamlet a little marketing pizzazz.

There are perhaps only one or two other places on the planet that would even hope to compare themselves to Montauk in terms of the opportunity they present a visitor to catch a fish — possibly a really big fish — from the shoreline of one of the seven seas. Mike Wright on his way to work.

You see, Montauk is a geographically unique place. Here, the shape of the New England coastline conspires with a ballet of tides and wind and the maritime food chain to create a showcase for some of Mother Nature's most awe-inspiring displays and give anglers unique access to fish that otherwise would be out of reach of landlubbers.

Experiencing what it is that makes Montauk a veritable Mecca for those obsessed with surfcasting can be a very easy and laid back affair involving beach chairs, or it can be a technical, athletic adventure that is more akin to mountaineering, amid the crashing waves.

For equipment, you can go as simple as a basic pole of at least 7 feet and a reel capable of holding at least 15-poundtest line and some bait or a lure called a bucktail (just ask at any tackle shop). A hundred bucks and you're ready. Or, depending on how aggressive you want to be, you may need to add waders, a jacket, rock-spikes and even flashlights for nighttime prowling to your arsenal.

Fish can be caught off the beach at just about any time between April and December, though certainly there are times when the catching — as compared to just fishing — is more reliable than others.

Sunrise and sunset are the cliché, but also accurate, "best times" on any given day, especially in the heat of summer.

But that does not mean that if you are planning a basic day at the beach that you shouldn't throw a rod and reel and a bucktail or some frozen clams in with the Kadima paddles and frisbee. You never know what's waiting at the water's edge in Montauk. **OM**

Editor's Note: Be sure to crush the barbs down on your hooks to minimize injury to fish you'll release... and to make hook release from fingers and hands easier as well.

The Montauk Point Lighthouse is the oldest lighthouse in New York, being authorized under George Washington in 1792. Completed in 1796, it still serves as an aid to navigation. It was designated a National Historic Landmark, in recognition of the property's national significance in the history of the United States, in 2012.

DOGS ARE NOT allowed on most beaches 10am – 6pm, May 15 through September 15.

BEACH FIRES are allowed on main town beaches from 5pm – 12am but must be fully contained in a metal container.

FOUR WHEEL DRIVE permits for the main town beaches can be purchased at the Town Hall Annex in the Montauk Playhouse. 631-668-5081.

NO VEHICLES allowed on the beaches 10am – 6pm, May 15 – September 15. Other beaches around Montauk require various state or county driving permits.

AMSTERDAM BEACH

Must Hike To Access, Remote, Unspoiled, Quiet, No Facilities, Dogs Ok

Walk the trail at Amsterdam Beach State Park and be rewarded by one of the most breathtaking vistas of unspoiled shoreline on the east coast. Meander along the intermittently sandy and rocky shoreline eastward or westward and be humbled. ENJOYING THE BEACHES ON MONTAUK: SAFETY FIRST

Montauk is all about beaches! Get out there and explore, but keep it safe and always watch your kids in the water. The ocean beach can be rough and treacherous on certain days.

Mind the rip currents and if in doubt, stay out. Lifeguards are generally on duty at most beaches from 10am-5pm through Labor Day.

Please note lifeguard status when choosing your spots, and the orange location signs. The sound side beaches (north side of Montauk) are generally calmer.

boarders. This iconic beach has beautiful cliffs rising at its western end at Shadmoor Park, restrooms, outdoor showers, lifeguards during the summer season, and concession trailers that serve more than just snacks. Parking restricted so arrange drop offs if you must drive.

EDISON BEACH

Sandy, Walkable From Village Hotels, Close To Everything, Limited Parking

Contiguous with Kirk Park beach at the heart of the Village at the end of South Edison Street, this popular beach has a lifeguard on duty during the summer months, restaurants, restrooms, and stores nearby. Limited public parking.

GIN BEACH

Sound Side, Calm, Families, Boat Watching, Walk To Shagwong Point, Resident Permit Parking

At the end of East Lake Drive on Block Island Sound and named for the cattle gins, or pens, that resided here for hundreds of years, Gin Beach is great for families with children, with gentle water and sandy beaches. You can watch the boats come in and out of Montauk Harbor. Parking by resident permit only so arrange drop offs If you must drive. Restrooms, outdoor showers, a concession trailer, and lifeguards during the summer season.

HITHER HILLS STATE PARK

Public Parking, Many Facilities, Sandy, Families

Four miles west of town on Old Montauk Highway. Lifeguards daily from mid June-Labor Day. Noncampers pay a \$10 parking fee. Nice playground, picnic tables, outdoor showers, restrooms, a changing area, and a general store.

KIRK PARK BEACH

Montauk's Main Town Beach; Free Parking; Wide, Sandy, Open, Families

West of town at the IGA supermarket. Park for free at Kirk Park parking lot, which contains free public restrooms (across from 7-Eleven). Lifeguards, restaurants and stores in walking distance. If only in town for a few hours, this is the beach.

BEACHES ON MONTAUK

MONTAUK POINT STATE PARK BEACH

Public Parking, Views, Facilities, Rocky, Hiking, Explore, No Lifeguards

Not a traditional "beach". Park at the lighthouse parking lot (fee during season), walk down to the rocky shoreline and enjoy majestic views of the lighthouse, watch surfcasters on the rocks, or meander around the hills overlooking the ocean. The fit can hike the rocky shoreline in either direction and enjoy unspoiled Montauk coastline or carefully cross atop the lighthouse revetment and watch the ocean's relentless assault on the giant boulders (note: the revetment is slated for overhaul in 2020 and may be offlimits when construction starts).

NAVY ROAD BEACH

Sound Side, Calm, Pebbly, Kayak Launch, Families, No Facilities, Resident Permit Parking

On beautiful Fort Pond Bay at the end of 2nd House Rd., over the railroad tracks. Great for launching kayaks, paddleboards, and small boats. A favorite spot for locals and families. The beach is pebbly, so take swim

shoes. Parking by resident permit only. Dine waterside at Navy Beach, just down the beach. Boats and small yachts frequently moor in the bay.

THE OTHER BEACHES

Walkable, even if not parkable

Montauk, surrounded by water on three sides, has many more beaches, but most of them are not protected by lifeguards and parking is not straightforward. For those who enjoy walking the beach, there are many options, as all beaches are public up to the high tide mark. A popular walk is from the village to Ditch Plains beach, where you see the cliffs of Shadmoor on the way. At high tide parts of the beach may be impassable.

Montauk is one of the east coast's top surfing towns, with a culture celebrated by many surfer-themed restaurants and shops.

Ditch Plains is the heart and soul of the surfer community. If you surf Ditch and you are a newbie, remember Ditch etiquette — the surfing areas are 250 feet in either direction to the east and west of the bathing beach.

Surfers looking for bigger waves head to **Camp Hero**, a rock-studded patch of right breakers beneath the cliffs, and Turtle Cove, the farthest east and perhaps best Montauk break, just below the Montauk Lighthouse.

Montauk is cycling heaven. A popular ride is to the lighthouse, about five miles from the village. En route detour to Camp Hero State Park where roads curve through secluded wooded areas near the ocean. Take a threemile detour to Montauk Harbor on West Lake Drive, a flat route with wide shoulders.

Mountain bikers can enjoy scenic rides over thousands of acres of parkland for the best mountain biking on Long Island. A great launch point is the Hither Woods trail head at the recycling center entrance about 1.5 miles west of town on Montauk Highway. Learn more at Parks & Trails, page 62.

Five great playgrounds in Montauk: 1. The Montauk School (enter at 2nd House Rd and S. Eaton); 2. next to the baseball field (at S. Edgemere and S. Erie Ave); 3. Hither Hills State Park; 4. Montauk Community Church (at S. Etna Ave. and S. Etna Pl.); 5. Montauk Lighthouse (lower parking area, also many grill stations).

Eddie Ecker County Park (aka the Dog Park) at the end of Navy Road is not a formal playground but a great open park space on Fort Pond Bay for frisbee, lawn games, running wild, walking the dog, etc.

OUTDOOR ACTIVITIES ON LAND

BEACH WALKS

Montauk is surrounded by beautiful beaches. Get out there and walk, explore and unwind.

From Town, East: Walk the beach from town eastward towards Ditch Plains for nice views of cliffs with sporadic rocky and sandy shoreline. At times reaching as far as Ditch may be tough, so pay attention to the tides.

From Town, West: Walk westward from town and pass through the beautiful Hither Hills beach, which can only be reached by walking or from private parking lots for neighborhood residents. See beautiful cliffside properties as you walk and wide expanses of white sand. You'll eventually hit Gurney's and their beach party setup, further still hitting Hither Hills State Park. You could walk all the way to East Hampton and beyond if you're inclined.

See our BEACHES section for more beach info. Other great walks would begin from Amsterdam Beach, Montauk Point, and Gin Beach. For beaches that are not easily accessible or have restricted parking, remember bicycles? For the energetic, a great ride would be to Gin Beach from Town, then walk to Shagwong point along the shoreline (bring water!).

SURFCASTING

Surfcasting in Montauk is epic and legendary, deservedly so. To do it successfully you'll need braided line at 30+ pound test and a nice selection of bucktails and plugs.

Always crush your barbs, bring fish in quickly, and release safely what you won't keep. Cast out by Camp Hero, the Lighthouse, and Gin Beach, plus all the south side beaches from Montauk Point to Hither Hills campground.

The top seasons for surfcasting are spring and fall, when stripers linger

off Montauk before migrating, but our big blues can be found from July through October. Permits to park after hours at Camp Hero and the Montauk Point Lighthouse Parking Lot or on the beach by the Lighthouse are sold at Montauk Downs, 631-668-5000.

Purchase Gin Beach driving permits at the park office at the end of East Lake Drive. Note: A license (it's free!) is required to fish beaches in NY State. Acquire your Marine Fishing License at dec.ny.gov.

FRESHWATER FISHING

Bass, sunfish, perch, and walleyes inhabit Montauk's ponds and lakes. Fort Pond is the largest, but others are deep in the woods, like Ovster Pond in Montauk Point State Park or Fresh Pond in Hither Hills State Park.

Fresh water fishing requires a license: ask at the NY State Park office at Montauk Downs. Fishing at Big Reed Pond in Theodore Roosevelt County Park requires a "Green Key" card, available at Montauk Downs.

Montauk is surrounded by water, and trails meandering through acres of unspoiled parks. White-tailed deer, foxes, raccoons, woodchucks, squirrels, opossums, and chipmunks abound. Watch for deer while driving! Migrating birds rest in the waters off Montauk Point, while seals inhabit our shores during winter and gannets torpedo into the ocean in the fall. Trail Maps are available at the Town Hall Annex in the Montauk Playhouse.

AMSTERDAM BEACH PRESERVE

Spectacular hike to a pristine, unspoiled beach.

A 200-acre park stretching from Ranch Road at Indian Field on the east to the Montauk Association houses (seven cottages designed by McKim, Mead and White in the 1880's) to the west extends southward to the Atlantic Ocean. The natural topography, called "Montauk Moorlands," has tidal and freshwater wetlands interspersed throughout maritime shrub lands. This main trail head on Montauk Highway begins a one-mile hike to the ocean bluffs taking you through a holly arbor and across streams. The hilly trail affords peeks of ocean through the brambles and ends at the ocean beach and bluffs. This easy-tonavigate trail offers a unique reward of coastal beauty. A great hike to an unspoiled beach.

CAMP HERO STATE PARK Great spot for biking, hiking, exploring.

This 415-acre state park is a decommissioned military base and a National Historic Site (also the home of conspiracy theories linked to the Philadelphia project). Several buildings, bunkers, batteries, and an old radar tower remain, although most are off limits to the public. Roads cross the park, along with an extensive system of trails for hiking, bicycling, horseback riding, a beach used by surfers and surfcasters, a picnic area with arills and an old maritime forest. To enter the park, bear right as you approach the lighthouse. Parking fee \$8 in season. Open daily year-round from sunrise to sunset. You can also park on Camp Hero Road (a right turn before Camp Hero along the highway) to hike Point Woods Trail, one of Montauk's most beautiful trails, taking you south of the highway to the bluffs.

CULLODEN POINT PRESERVE Great hike through a natural habitat.

This park is named after the HMS Culloden, a British 74-gun, 170-ft warship that sank in 1781 about 200 yards from shore, where it still rests. A well-marked trail that takes about 2 hours to loop (a mile or less to the shoreline) leads from the parking area off Flamingo Avenue to a picturesque rocky beach on Fort Pond Bay. The trailhead is next to a small plaque commemorating the shipwreck. The natural wooded area and shoreline has seen little change from the days when the Montauketts lived here in a world of hidden ponds, specimen trees, wetlands and beautiful shoreline. Great views of the bluffs at Culloden Point.

EDDIE ECKER COUNTY PARK

Great dog spot, launch kayaks, canoes.

Located at the end of Navy Road (cross the train tracks, turn left), the large, open park has a fishing pier, rocky beach and offers easy access to trails in Hither Woods Preserve. A good place for launching kayaks and canoes into Fort Pond Bay. Take your dogs to play. Open year round. Free parking.

STAYING SAFE: A TICK PRIMER

We all know that that Lyme Disease is transmitted through infected blood from a Blacklegged, or Deer, tick bite. Deer ticks require the presence of white-tailed deer to successfully complete their life cycle, hence the name. Ironically, ticks do not pick up the Lyme bacterium from deer but from other animals among the 300 species they bite.



Local experts at End Tick & Mosquito Control recommend spraying your property and doing a **"tick check"** anytime you have been in or near typical tick danger areas such as tall grass and leaf litter. Check for ticks under your arms, your groin and behind your ears. Afterwards, shower as soon as possible.

If an attached tick is found, it should be removed carefully and promptly by gently and slowly pulling the tick out by grasping its head with tweezers. Use of insect repellants with high levels of DEET on your skin and repellants containing **Permethrin** on your clothing will also greatly reduce the threat. If you must go into tick areas, wear long sleeves and long pants, pull socks over pant legs and tuck in your shirt.

Be aware, alert, and safe as you enjoy Montauk!

PARKS & TRAILS ON MONTAUK

HIKING TIPS

Buy a trail map. Although major trails are marked, many divergent ones are not. Leaf cover can mask trails, causing confusion. Also, after heavy rains some trails may be muddy or inundated. Get a trail map from the town's website; ehamptonny.gov/ DocumentCenter/View/1648/ Trail-Guide-East

CAROL MORRISON PARK & FORT POND HOUSE

Launch kayaks, canoes, or picnic

Carol Morrison Park, containing Fort Pond House, is located on a four-acre site overlooking Fort Pond with a grill station, benches, and open space for play. Steps down to the pond allow for launching kayaks, etc. Carol Morrison was a well-loved conservationist and it is appropriate that this park, which narrowly escaped being sold to private developers in 2010, should be named after her. The house on the premises is available for meetings and other events by appointment through the East Hampton Recreation Department, 631-324-2417.

HITHER HILLS STATE PARK

Fish, play, hike, bike, facilities

The large beachfront park along Old Montauk Highway sits on two-anda-half-miles of Atlantic Ocean beach and boasts 1,755 acres of parkland that stretches to Napeague Harbor. Along with hiking and nature trails, it has 168 campsites that can be reserved through ReserveAmerica. com. Activities include ocean swimming, saltwater fishing, guided nature hikes, and children's programs. Non-campers are welcome, but must pay a \$10 daily parking fee. Open year round from sunrise to sunset, 631-668-2554.

HITHER HILLS STATE PARK COMPLEX, HITHER WOODS PRESERVE AND LEE KOPPELMAN NATURE PRESERVE

These adjacent multi-use parks, contiguous with Hither Hills State Park, contain 3,000 acres with 18 different trails covering over 40 miles of terrain stretching from the sound to the Atlantic. To access the trails north of Montauk Highway, park at either the highway overlook at Hither Woods (a large pull-off), the recycling center (1.5 miles west of the village on Montauk Highway), or at the Navy Road (Eddie Ecker Park) parking lot. Bike or hike to Fresh Pond or take a beautiful coastal walk at Rocky Point. Even though the trails are blazed with color-coded markers, hikers should take maps.

KIRK PARK

Close to town, free parking

This quaint three-acre park, just west of the village, is maintained by the Montauk Village Association. It includes Fort Pond, which is the second largest freshwater lake on Long Island, a picnic area, a pavilion on Fort Pond, and it's next to the Second House Museum (the oldest structure in Montauk) and Montauk Indian Museum.

MONTAUK MOUNTAIN

A vanishing natural element with rare plants

Montauk Mountain Preserve contains one of the few remaining maritime grasslands in New York and supports some of the state's rarest plants. It contains three extremely rare denizens of this distinctive and disappearing habitat: bushy rockrose, Nantucket shadbush, and New England blazing star. DO NOT TOUCH OR DISTURB these specimens. The six-acre preserve is maintained by the Nature Conservancy. To get there, follow Second House Road north 0.7 miles to an asphalt road on the left. Park at the end of the asphalt road by the Nature Conservancy sign. The preserve is at the end of the road past the last house on the right.

MONTAUK POINT STATE PARK

Lighthouse, fishing, hiking

This 724-acre park at the site of the Montauk Point Lighthouse offers breathtaking views of the sea, Block Island Sound, and Block Island to the northeast, and is great for bird watching vegr-round and seal watching in winter. Park then set off on foot to explore. Ask for a trail map at the toll booth. The park has surfcasting, five miles of marked and unmarked hiking trails, a picnic area with tables, a playground, restaurant, gift shop, and restrooms. Daily parking is \$8. The Montauk Point Lighthouse, a museum run by the Montauk Historical Society, is open daily in season. This park is contiguous with Camp Hero Park and the Sanctuary and there are several hiking trails that cross them. To

the north of Montauk Highway, look for signs for Money Pond Trail, Oyster Pond trail and the Seal Haul Out Trail, where seals can be seen on the rocks just off shore in winter. Attractions: beautiful rugged shorelines, migrating birds, hidden ponds, seals in the winter. Also see WALKING DUNES, page 66.

SHADMOOR STATE PARK Easy hiking, great ocean views, WWII structures

Located two miles east of the village on Montauk Highway, this 99-acre tract of land has a half mile of ocean frontage where tall clay cliffs plunge down to a pebble strewn beach. About 30 percent of Shadmoor is freshwater wetlands with several small ponds hidden in the thickets. Trails and dirt roads lead to the bluffs from the entrance on Montauk Highway, offering an easy walk. A passive-use park, Shadmoor was home to two WWII gun emplacement sites trained on offshore waters to deter German submarines.

MONTAUK COUNTY PARK Hiking, views, fishing, camping

Two entrances: one at the end of East Lake Drive just north of the airport, where the park office is located, and the other at Third House, three miles east of the village on Montauk Highway. The park's 1,126 acres feature 3.5 miles of color coded nature trails restricted for hiking (a self-guided brochure is available), five miles of bridle paths, a picnic area, freshwater fishing and canoeing at Big Reed Pond, and surfcasting on the outer beach (Gin Beach

and Shagwong Point). Camping is permitted for up to seven days from April through November on the outer beach for vehicles with permits that are self-contained trailers. Tents are not allowed. The view of Big Reed Pond from the observation deck on the blue trail will make you understand why it's a Registered Natural Landmark.

WALKING DUNES

Self-guided dune hike, unspoiled nature

Part of Hither Hills State Park on the east side of Napeague Harbor, the Walking Dunes reach a height of 80 feet as they slowly move southeast. To get to the dunes, head west on Montauk Highway and turn right at Napeague Harbor Road and drive to the end of the paved road. Park here and follow the path to your right until you reach the dunes. A self-guided nature trail, the three mile loop has great views of Napeague Harbor and winds atop the ridge of the North Dune, which is the most active of the three parabolic, or U-shaped dunes. This area is a natural wonder and deceptively fragile so stay on the trails.

GUIDED HIKES


